Breckland Council announced earlier this month that Watton's Sports and Social club had been successful in bidding for £107,000. The skatepark was designed by young people during lockdown. They undertook several meetings with the design team to make "THIS IS AN EXCITING OPPORTUNITY TO PROVIDE A SPACE FOR YOUTH WITHIN THE COMMUNITY AND SURROUNDING VILLAGES TO SOCIALISE, AS WELL AS PARTAKE IN SPORTING ACTIVITY.



BRECKLAND & WEST NORFOLK

The Association of Young People's Mental Health Inquiry

Young Commissioners from Breckland and West Norfolk were thrilled to attend the Association for Young People's Mental Health (AYPH) Inquiry in Euston, London for the day in December 2022. The main purpose of the visit was for young people to have their voice heard, contribute to discussions with other youth groups in attendance and find out more about the impact of climate change on young people's mental health.



The AYPH Youth Advisory Panel is currently leading an Inquiry into how climate change is affecting young people's health in the UK. They have been collecting evidence from young people all over the country and presented their findings at the event. Young people heard from experts in health, education, policy and voluntary sectors. They spent the afternoon working together to develop recommendations on how to build resilient communities in the face of climate change. Young commissioners enjoyed the event and came back with lots of ideas for their own climate change work.

Disability Campaign: All-Inclusive Parks for Young People

Breckland and West Norfolk are continuing work on their Disability Campaign to have all-inclusive play equipment fitted to parks. Breckland County Council have said that moving forward they will be thinking about and making sure that there is some all-inclusive play equipment in their parks, and are unsure as to why this hasn't been done previously. We continue to work hard and collect research.

Young commissioners and students from the College of West Anglia have had a healthy competition on logo designs to represent the campaign and have received many fantastic entries showing all the creative and artistic talents. The winner was Alana Reynolds from Breckland Youth

Advisory Board. Four West Norfolk Young Commissioners attended the King's Lynn Town Council Meeting in January to present their PowerPoint which included a recent piece of research in the local King's Lynn area, which asked about inclusive equipment in The Walks. They discussed the importance of this type of equipment to families and young people's lives and gave suggestions on the different types of equipment they would like to see in the park. They discussed their recent research and findings, along with ideas of equipment that they would like to see in The Walks.

The feedback received from the Councillors was very positive and they were impressed at the findings of their research and persistence in making this change in their local area.

WEST NORFOLK

Meadow of Hope

West Norfolk YAB have commissioned Blackfield Creatives to work with young people to create a meadow of flowers made from single use plastics which will be displayed across West Norfolk. Young Commissioners have been working closely with Blackfield Creatives to make these flowers and create a workshop video so that young people can also make them at home, school, or at a youth group.

The YAB also attended a Downham Market Town Council Meeting to talk about this project and gain permission to have the flowers displayed in their town. The Council were very impressed with the young commissioners and were happy to have these flowers exhibited. These flowers will be displayed later in the summer to raise awareness of recycling and protecting the environment.

Run in conjunction with Sheringham Town Council and the YMCA. The group regularly has around 20 people attending each week and continues to grow in popularity!

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

We are looking forward to our next Intergenerational event at Easter, and some follow up cooking courses, for those who have completed their Food Hygiene.


